Presentation Community Raise Movember Funds



It has not been an easy few months as we learned to grapple with the new normal, but, as always the determination & dedication of our school community shown through.


I am forever grateful to the hardworking staff of the school and to our excellent students who have been a pleasure to deal with since August.

Unfortunately due to Covid-19 the finals of all these leagues were unable run and placings were decided on current standings. We look forward to the possibility of being able to compete again in the new year!








Student Council- How does it work?

Eimear Doyle sat down with her sister Sarah to find out a little bit more about how the **Student Council** at our school works.

- * The student council is the **voice of the student body** in the school. there are three representatives from each year. They are a voice to Mr Ryan and management.
- * They raise issues from day-to-day things like the uniform, vending machines, school facilities for students and the canteen. To long-term issues like schools policies to improve the school environment.
- * The students council assist us and organise fundraisers and represent the school at events and meetings with management.
- * This student council is a great opportunity to work with others and build friendships. They work closely with the Irish second level student union (ISSU) They not only have a voice in school but they have a voice national.
- * To be **elected** to the student council you must first get two sponsors from two people. Then you will get a form to fill out and your two sponsors will sign it.
- * The student council worked with Mr Ryan this year to abolish the rule that you can only have red and clear nail polish now you can have any colour nails you want.
- * As a first-year representative you observe the meetings until Christmas so that you understand and are aware of how the meeting runs and how they work together.
- * At the beginning they do a training day. This is a very beneficial and sheds light on certain aspects of the student council. Once elected they sign a **student council constitution** stating the basic rules and regulations of this you can cancel and outlining the roles of all the members.
