
<u>Gymnastics Stars</u>




Training takes place each Tuesday after school for 1st years and Wednesdays for 2nd years. League matches for both these teams commence after Christmas.





<u>3rd Graphics Students Ace CBA 2</u> with Impressive Technical Designs

Academic Achievement

Presentation Wexford has launched a new initiative this year to boost academic achievement. Each student now has an academic tracker in their school journal for each subject. Please see a sample page below. They can be found from page 119 of the journal.

The objective is that every student will set a SMART (specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, time bound) target for each subject. Then, after every test they will plot their result on the graph for that subject. They can then draw a line between the results and they will have a clear, visual representation of their grades, if their grades are improving or not, and if they are achieving their target. If they are not meeting their target they will find ways to improve and write those in on the tracker sheet as well. The aim would then be to improve on each test by approximately 5% until they reach their target.

There is a space for parents and guardians to initial each test result if you wish. This is an excellent way to get an overall view of how your child is doing academically in each subject.

From measuring wave frequency to examining sediment samples, the investigation offered an immersive learning experience. It was a golden opportunity to witness first-hand the forces that shape our coastlines and to see the practical applications of their academic studies.

The day at Curracloe Beach wasn't just about ticking a box for their Leaving Certificate. It was about connecting with nature, fostering a deeper understanding of geographical phenomena, and bonding as a class.

In the afternoon, the students packed up their equipment, leaving the beach with a sense of accomplishment and a wealth of practical knowledge to bolster their classroom learning. This investigation will surely be a cornerstone of their educational journey, merging textbook theories with tangible experiences, and preparing them for their upcoming exams.

It is fun learning a new language but it can also be hard sometimes I find that activity and pair work is better for me because it helps me say stuff in the language I'm studying and I prefer pair work.




