# Thank You to Our Past Pupils

A huge thank you to Orla, Stacey, Sara, and Jamie for their wonderful input and contribution to our ever-growing past pupil profiles. Their stories and insights will be displayed on campus in the coming weeks, celebrating the achievements of our school community.



**Subjects studied in school and if they helped you in any way on the course:**  
I studied Biology, Maths and Home Economics, all three were the most helpful since I began my third level education. Obviously Biology has really given me a grounding in my Science Degree and cannot recommend it enough if you plan or even think that a science course at that level might be for you. Along with Biology, Maths and Home Economics have really helped me in my first year of college.

**Why did you end up where you did:**  
I frequently studied Medicine at Queen's University Belfast. I originally planned to study Medicine in Ireland through the HPAT, but I missed the required score by two points in my Leaving Cert year. That year, I received an offer for Pharmacy in Queen's. Since I was still determined to study Medicine, I decided to sit the UCAT instead of repeating the HPAT, as the UCAT took place before college began. I hadn't known about the UCAT in time so I sat it during my Leaving Cert year. I studied Pharmacy at Queen's while applying for Medicine there for the following year. I preferred the UCAT to the HPAT - I found its structure and question style much clearer and more suited to how I think. Queen's also includes interviews as part of their application process. My interview took place in January, and a month or two later I received an offer to study Medicine.

**What are you enjoying about the course:**  
I really enjoy many aspects of medicine, especially the practical and patient-focused elements. The case-based learning sessions are fascinating, as they connect theory to real clinical situations. I also love the Family Advisee Scheme, where we get to visit patients and see how medicine impacts people's lives beyond the hospital. It's invaluable reading and reinforces why I wanted to study Medicine in the first place.

**What's the course about:**  
The Medicine course at Queen's is designed to build students into competent, compassionate doctors who always put the patient first. It combines scientific knowledge with clinical skills, communication, and professionalism. The whole approach is centred on developing not only the academic understanding of medicine but also the human side of being a doctor.

**What modules are you studying:**  
The course is structured as the main module that's divided into several key sections. These include Clinical Skills, Fundamentals of Clinical Science, Blood, Cardiovascular and Respiratory Systems and Family Medicine. Each section helps integrate science with clinical practice, allowing us to apply what we learn in real-life medical contexts.

**Core focus and teaching methods:**  
Comprehensive legal education. The program covers a wide range of topics, including European competition law, criminal law, family law, and financial regulation.

**Subjects studied in school and if they helped you in any way on the course:**  
As a student, I studied English, Maths, Biology, German and Politics. Independently, I completed exams on Business and Public Relations and throughout my first year of college to have a better understanding of the world and how it works especially in the field of Law. I found English a mix of history and philosophy. While also analysing arguments that we discussed in the Politics class. Another I found English highly useful as I have to write a lot of essays and it provided me with a solid background and a structured approach to advanced writing.

**Why did you end up where you did:**  
It was actually my father who found the University, as we were all looking for a good Law School in Europe, since Italy (my home country) would not accept my Irish Leaving Cert, because I only did it in one year. Maastricht was very high in the rankings and, taking a more in-depth look at the courses provided, I really thought that it was exactly what I was looking for.

**What are you enjoying about the course:**  
The way the course is structured, and it being based on Problem-Based Learning, putting the students in the position to actively learn and understand together with the teachers while putting in practice the endless readings, is great.

**What's the course about:**  
The course analyses law in general, in an European and international context. We learn to better understand how different nations interact with each other but also within their own legal system. It provides a broad and in-depth understanding of European law, its institutions, and its impact on a range of legal fields. The curriculum is structured around the principles of European integration, with options to specialize in specific areas like business law or public governance.

**What modules are you studying:**  
I am currently studying Private International Law. But students can choose from several specializations or opt for a more general curriculum.


**European Business Law:** Focuses on the legal aspects of market integration, including the four freedoms, competition law, state aid law, and social policy.

**European Public Law and Governance:** Explores decision-making and constitutional law within the EU, including multilevel governance, fundamental rights, and the enforcement of EU law.

**Law of Sustainable Europe:** Analyses how law addresses sustainability challenges, such as environmental protection, social justice, and human rights.

**General Programme:** Offers flexibility to students who want to combine courses from different specializations to literature and a creative writing class. Each semester I must take new classes to complete my degree. In America you need credits to graduate meaning you can take fun classes like yoga, ultimate Frisbee and dance classes to earn extra credit which allows you to graduate, and they're a lot of fun!

**Subjects studied in school and if they helped you in any way on the course:**  
I studied Science, English, Geography, Biology, Ag Science and LCVP in Presentation Secondary School. Biology, Ag Science and LCVP are the main three subjects that helped me during my course. **Why did you end up where you did:**  
I ended up becoming a Garda because it was always a career I was interested in pursuing. I was very interested in either the Defence Forces, An Garda Síochána or Dublin Fire Brigade, but for me the variety and the practical side of the Gardaís appealed to me the most. There are also many opportunities to progress my career in the Gardaís. There are a number of different specialised units and roles that I would like to pursue down the line in my career. Another big part of the job that I love is the team aspect of the job and my colleagues having my back, as well as me having theirs. The friendships I have made in the college down in Templemore and also now, where I am stationed in Store Street, DMR North, in Dublin City Centre, will last until I retire in 2050!

**What are you enjoying about the course:**  
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**What's the course about:**  
The Garda course is a two-year foundation training program at the Garda College that leads to a BA in Applied Policing Skills, combining classroom learning, physical training, and a probationary period in stations. It includes subjects like law, community policing, and self-defence, and requires trainees to be resilient, physically fit, and dedicated. The program consists of three phases: 22 weeks at the college in Templemore, 24 weeks in an allocated station as a probationary Garda and an autonomous probationary period, which lasts until my final Garda meeting where I get signed off as no longer being a probationary Garda I am aiming for mid-2026.

**What modules are you studying:**  
I am studying Crime-Linked Policing, Road Traffic and Law and Procedure to achieve my Bachelors of Arts Degree in Applied Policing (Level 7 on the NQF), which is accredited by University of Limerick, and to also pass my probation happily in 2026.

**Subjects studied in school and if they helped you in any way on the course:**  
I studied Maths, English, Geography, Biology, Ag Science and LCVP in Presentation Secondary School. Biology, Ag Science and LCVP are the main three subjects that helped me during my course. **Why did you end up where you did:**  
I ended up going to do Animal Care and Grooming because I am planning on applying for An Garda Síochána. I decided that I would wait a few years before applying and do a college course that had something to do with animals as my main goal is to apply for the Dog Unit once I'm in An Garda Síochána for a few years. This course would be a step towards that goal.

**What are you enjoying about the course:**  
I am enjoying learning about animals more in depth, learning about every dog breed and how to groom dogs. I am enjoying the obedience part of my course, as within the An Garda Síochána Dog Unit, you must train the dog in obedience and other forms of Garda work and be with your assigned dog day and night. Nutrition for the dog is very important as the health of the Garda dog is essential to maintaining a fit and healthy dog. There are many different breeds of dog assigned to the Dog Unit, so this course allows me to understand the different breeds.

**What's the course about:**  
This college course is called Animal Care and Grooming. This course is for people that wish to pursue a career in Dog Grooming or Animal Husbandry industry. You get to study a lot of very interesting modules about animals and dog grooming. This course helps you to learn how to work in a modern dog grooming studio. There are numbers of trip like trips to Dublin Zoo, secret valley, and guest speakers that come in and talk about first aid training and animal nutrition. Once you graduate from this course you can work in several fields such as, Grooming Studio, Vet Clinics, Dog and Catery Kennels, Self Employment, Animal Sanctuaries and of course Further Third Level Education. It is a one-year course but can be advanced to two years as there is a course called Advanced Animal Science which you can only do if you have a QQ Level 5 Animal Care course.

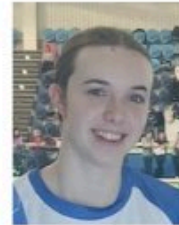
## 6th Years Enjoy End-of-Term Trip to Dundrum

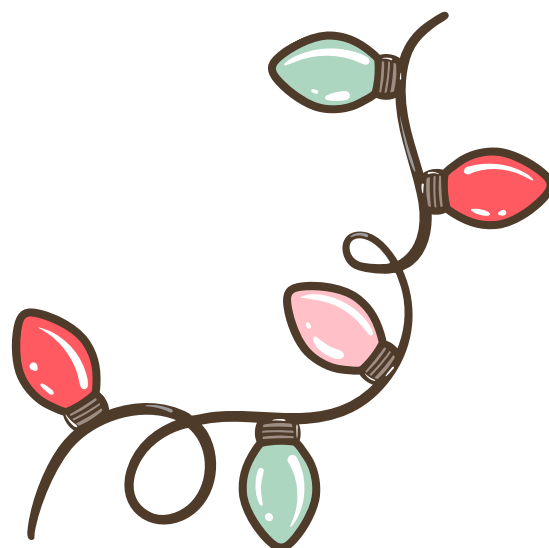
